Catholic High School To Close Next June

The first Catholic high school in the San Fernando Valley will close its doors at the end of this school year, after 45 years of service.

The Board of Directors of Our Lady of Corvallis High School, Studio City, recently announced that declining enrollment and increasing financial pressures are two of the main reasons the all-girls college prep school will cease to exist after June, 1987.

"It has become unfeasible to continue the school beyond the current year," said John D. Wiley, President of the Board. "The decision to close comes after much painful deliberation."

According to Wiley, the problem is more complex than simply a lack of money. Since 1981 Our Lady of Corvallis has operated from its long-

time campus on a lease basis. The Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary founded the school in 1941 and turned it over to become an independent school in 1981.

As landlords the Sisters have stated that they will not entertain a lease extension or purchase option, since they have their own future plans for the property at 3921 Laurel

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
